

What is registration?



- Registration provides public protection by ensuring that only competent public health professionals are registered, and that high standards of practice are maintained (safe pair of hands).
- UKPHR (United Kingdom Public Health Register) is the regulatory body for PH Practitioners

Who is Registration for?

Individuals who are:

- Working to improve health and wellbeing
- Already working as Public Health professionals (at least 2 years in a PH role)
- Working autonomously in a specific area of work
- Continually developing their own area of work
- Supporting others to understand their area of work
- Supporting or contributing to working in multi-agency and multi-disciplinary environments
- Able to satisfy the requirements of all 34 UKPHR practitioner standards (determined through self-assessment and interview)

-Some gaps expected at application stage, must be able to fill these within 6 months of joining scheme

You could be working within any one of the four domains of Public Health

- 1. Health Improvement
- 2. Healthcare Public Health
- 3. Academic Public Health
 - 4. Health Protection


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What is required?



- You will need to produce a portfolio of work
- This will contain a write up of 3 distinct pieces of work that we call commentaries that together address all 34 of the UKPHR standards for registration.

For example.



- Backed up by evidence to show that you have sufficient knowledge, understanding and application
- Along with your CV and Job description, a final reference and testimonial
- The portfolio is assessed, verified and if meets the UKPHR requirements, the practitioner is recommended to UKPHR for registration.



Introducing the standards

34 standards spread over 8 areas of practice

- 1.Practising professionally, ethically and legally
- 2. Using public health information
- 3. Assessing the evidence for public health interventions and services
- 4. Protecting the public from health risks
- 5. Implementing public health policy and strategy
- 6. Collaborating across organisations and boundaries
- 7. Planning, implementing and evaluating public health programmes and projects
- 8. Communicating with others to improve health outcomes and reduce health inequalities

For every standard the practitioner must demonstrate 3 elements:







E.g. standard 7.4 Evaluate a Public Health intervention, reporting on its effect and making suggestions for improvement.

Introducing the Thames Valley Scheme

- The Thames Valley scheme has been running for over 10 years in its current format
- It is <u>not a training programme</u>, but it does facilitate and support practitioners who meet the entry criteria in filling gaps in their knowledge and experience so that they can prepare a portfolio of evidence to achieve registration with the UKPHR.
- The Thames Valley scheme has a strong reputation for providing a high level of support for practitioners and has been commended for the high quality of the work submitted within portfolios.
- It is an 11 Month timeline from induction to completion of portfolio that includes:
 - Application and interview process
 - Induction day
 - 4 portfolio development group days
 - Feedback on draft work prior to submission
 - Mentor support
 - Mid-year review
 - Assessment of submitted work

Once your portfolio is complete it goes through a process of verification.

Successful practitioners are then able to apply for registration with the UKPHR.

An overview of the Scheme

Attend masterclasses & fill gaps in knowledge



Expectations of you:

- Fill gaps in knowledge and/or application
- Complete <u>3</u> written pieces of work (commentaries) to demonstrate knowledge, understanding & application of all 34 standards
- Participate in all aspects of the programme including masterclasses, evaluation and ongoing support of the scheme
- Meet scheme deadlines and submit work using the e portfolio platform

The support you can expect during the scheme

Engagement in a portfolio development group

Protected time with your peers in a safe and constructive environment

- ✓ To help guide you through the portfolio requirements.
- ✓ To access support and challenge from peers in different Public Health roles
- ✓ To explore how you will fill gaps in knowledge and experience
- ✓ To motivate you to keep yourself on track and complete your portfolio



- Feedback on your draft work prior to submission
- An interim review to support you with your progress
- · Access to a trained mentor
- Engagement with your line manager prior to submission of your written work

Benefits of joining the scheme

Gives you access to opportunities to fill and refresh gaps in your knowledge Access to a network of support and expertise

Reinforces the importance of research and evidence in your practice

Develops confidence in Public Health practice

Supports career development

Facilitates you in gaining professional registration and provides recognition that you are safe to practice and equipped with up-to-date knowledge

Provides the opportunity to reflect on your practice and recognise your achievements

What happens at the end of the scheme?

- Your final portfolio will be reviewed by a verifier and a verification panel will determine if you have met the criteria for registration
- Successful candidates will be recommended to UKPHR
- You will apply to go on the UKPHR register
 - -Annual fee payable-£121 (You can claim tax relief on professional fees)
- Revalidation is every five years: registered practitioners are expected to maintain their CPD to fulfil revalidation (75 hours over 5 years)
- But most of all, a great achievement!



Criteria for joining the Thames Valley Scheme

- Employment in Thames Valley
- Minimum of 2 years' public health experience, in an NHS agenda for change band 5 7 post (or equivalent role). Working autonomously.
- Demonstration of a broad range of relevant experience, with any gaps capable of being met within 6 months of starting on the scheme
- Commitment to completing a portfolio by 17 December 2025, with the expectation that applicants will dedicate a significant amount of personal time along with up to 8 days of work time
- Commitment from your line manager to support you through the process
- To read and understand the UKPHR Public Health Practitioner Guidance for Applicants, Assessors and Verifiers Document, prior to submitting an application



The Application Process

Complete Application form

- Section A Your details
- Section B Supporting information
- Section C –Signed Declarations
 Include Your CV (including qualifications and record of CPD)

Complete Equality Diversity & Inclusion form
Complete Baseline Self- Assessment

Application deadline: 13th November 2024 12pm

Interviews for Shortlisted Candidates: 4th December 2024

The baseline self-assessment

- An opportunity to start to get familiar with the standards and check whether you are ready to apply
- Be honest in your self assessment for each standard. You are expected to have some gaps.
- Start by identifying 3 pieces of work that together could allow you to address all of the standards. For example:

- 2. Carrying out a health-needs assessment
- 3. Developing a strategy for obesity prevention
- 1. Warm homes prevention programme
- 2. Improving vaccination rates during COVID
- 3. Project to Increase physical activity for older people




